- 1977 group approaches E.C. about curbside recycling, E.C. recommends curbside to city, city says the cost is prohibitive.
 - RAA organizes in loose confederation with Washtenaw County Friends of the Earth. November 1977 RAA incorporates.
- 1978 May RAA began biweekly collections to 10% of West Side modified to monthly Dec. Bottle Bill goes into effect. Reduces solid waste stream by nearly 9%. (This reduction in waste stream is later used as in against curbside recycling.) justification
- 1979 CETA funds first two paid positions for RAA.
- 1980 RAA began using S. Industrial site for shipping/transferring materials.
