The Ecology Center was opened almost a year ago to provide a continuing outlet for environmental information to the Ann Arbor community.

ecology ann arbor: Since that time, the Center has sponsored glass and paper recycling, a community teachin, a major clean-up on the Huron River, and more than 20 seminars on topics such as land use, pesticides, and lifestyles. In addition to seminars, the Ecology Center produces a weekly radio program, Earth Watch, which explores regional, state and national environmental issues.

Currently, the Ecology Center is involved in promoting several special projects. The "Living With The Earth" seminar series teaches concerned citizens organic gardening and ecologically sound lifestyles. Complementing the seminar series, the community organic garden provides students, faculty, and citizens with opportunities to work together in the planting and care of a cooperative garden. During Earth Week, April 17- 24, the Center is sponsoring several seminars, a bicycle parade, and Earth Fete.
