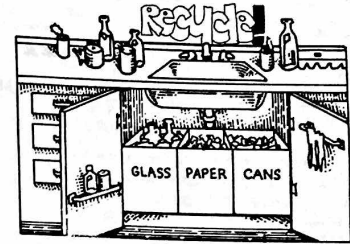
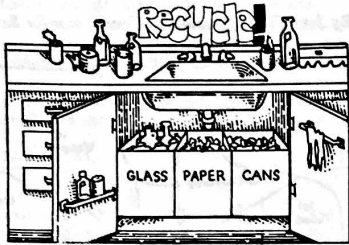


# Your Very Own Quality Control Sheet

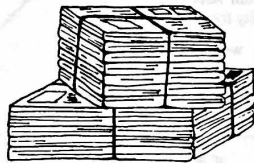

### Paper Products

Bundled newspaper, tied or brown-bagged (NO wet or yellowed paper, please)  
 Corrugated cardboard, flattened and bundled  
 Brown paper bags  
 Bundled white bond/office paper (NO paper clips, please)  
 Bundled computer paper  
 Bundled colored bond  
 Boxed computer cards, plain and colored (NO rubber bands, please)



Books  
 Magazines  
 Phone books  
 Gray cardboard (cereal boxes, etc.)  
 Envelopes  
 Shredded paper  
 Paper with crayon markings  
 Waxed or aluminized cardboard (butter boxes, milk cartons, etc.)



### Aluminum

Beverage cans, flattened  
 Foil  
 Trays  
 Siding  
 Pots and pans  
 Storm doors (disassembled, please)  
 Outdoor furniture



Space limitations on the truck prevent us from taking anything over three feet in length

Non-aluminum handles and components removed if possible.

### Petroleum Products

Used motor oil  
 Kerosene (2 gallons or less)  
 Synthetic oil (2 gallons or less)  
 Vacuum pump oil

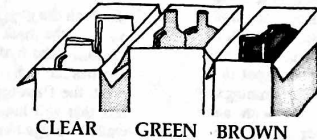


Antifreeze  
 Gasoline  
 Solvents  
 Thinners

Please use unbreakable containers. If set out on the curbside, nothing larger than a three gallon container.

### Glass Products

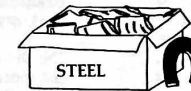
Clear glass jars and bottles  
 Green glass jars and bottles  
 Brown glass jars and bottles  
 For all glass: cleaned and lids removed



Drinking glasses  
 Mirrors  
 Windows  
 Pyrex  
 Ceramics

### Tin/Steel

Tin cans\* (paper removed, top and bottom removed, flattened)  
 Steel jar lids  
 Scrap steel (under 50 lbs. please)

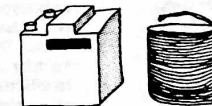


Bi-metal cans (steel and aluminum mix, e.g. tennis ball cans)

\*round bottom cans should be flattened as much as possible. If you are physically unable to flatten them, we will do so at the drop-off station. The residential curbside trucks can accept only a few of the unflattened cans due to space limitations.

 Brass and copper scrap
